





This program is available through a partnership between the Helena-Lewis and Clark National Forest, Montana Discovery Foundation, Lewis & Clark County, Montana DNRC, State Historic Preservation Office, and Helena College. "This summer was full of new experiences. Besides the science side of it, I learned how to work on my team and the teams that collaborated with us. So, I definitely learned how to deal with many different personalities. I also learned that if I have a question, I need to just ask it and not worry about if it is stupid or not, because nine times out of ten my supervisor was just delighted about my question. Helena Area Summer Jobs Program Participant Summer Work Experience: Youth Forest Monitoring Program (YFMP)

Summer Jobs Program - Regional Highlights: A Recap

Helena Area - AJAY MT partnered with Helena College to provide the work skills training through the Continuing Education department at Helena College in 2023

Flathead - Workforce Flathead provided mentoring through a group mentoring cohort model. Participants met each week to connect and discuss work over a meal.

Bozeman - AJAY MT worked with the City of Bozeman and Bozeman school district to launch the program. Gallatin College & West Paw, a private business, delivered the work skills training.

Anaconda - Discover Anaconda continues to be a dedicated partner helping to coordinate the local Summer Jobs Program. In our second year, we gained traction among community partners.

Whitehall - We piloted the program in our smallest community yet.

Yellowstone County - The local program committee secured some especially unique positions for the older participants to get professional experience. We partnered with Billings NextGEN, the Billings Chamber's group for emerging community leaders, to source mentors.

Capacity Building FACILITATING WORKSHOPS ON "A FRAMEWORK

FOR UNDERSTANDING POVERTY" BY RUBY PAYNE

Goal:

Increase the number of educators and student service professionals across Montana trained in helping students of all economic backgrounds achieve academic, professional, and personal success.

Impact:

Students of all backgrounds have the knowledge and skills to succeed in their academic and work worlds. In order to achieve our vision of all young Montanans having access to meaningful work and professional support, AJAY MT employs a variety of strategies.

Strategy in action:

In 2023, AJAY MT presented a six-hour workshop to Montana State University Billings student service professionals. The workshop focused on how economic class affects behavior and mindset, resources that lead to student success, strategies to help students better understand common hidden rules of school and work, and effective interventions for under-resourced students. We also presented a one-hour workshop at the Montana College Access Network conference.
