## Youth summer jobs program kicks off in Anaconda

American Jobs for America's Youth kicks off its Summer Jobs Program in June, with high school students starting paid positions to build skills, explore careers, and strengthen the local workforce. The Summer Jobs Program or SJP has grown from its roots in Helena to serve 75 students, with new regional programs in Anaconda, Billings, Bozeman, Whitehall and the Flathead Valley.

Bridger Johnston of Anaconda participated in the SJP last year, working for Crummer Construction LLC.

"We did framing work, built additions and decks, and put siding on houses," Johnston said. "If I ever need to build something, I could. It taught me a lot. It also taught me a good work ethic."

American Jobs for America's Youth in Montana created SJP in 2019. By 2022 enrollment doubled, with the program expanding to six areas.

"Our partners make it happen," said Executive Director Gabrielle Eklund Rowley, who actively engages students, volunteers, and agencies to grow the program. "It's a very collaborative effort."

The SJP matches high school students and recent grads with paid work experience, providing work skills training and connecting students with adult mentors.

"The work skills training and opportunities to grow

employability skills are unmatched. This program is essential in moving the dial in the workforce arena and shows a huge benefit to our community and area businesses," said McKinley Winkle, vice president of the Helena Area Chamber of Commerce.

Local program partners include Discover Anaconda, Anaconda Community Intervention, businesses, Anaconda High School, and Reach Higher Montana. Funding for the program comes from the Gianforte

Family Foundation and other private foundations, community foundations, sponsors, and individual donors.

The program helps communities as well as the young employees, Eklund Rowley said.

"The program is designed to sustainably improve the lives of young workers. The job skills students learn serve them well after the program ends, benefiting them as individuals and strengthening their communities."

Businesses also benefit. "Opportunity Bank of

Montana sees tremendous value in the Summer Jobs Program and the additional workforce pipelines it creates," said Tom Burkhart, recruitment and retention officer. "We've matched with several fantastic students, one of whom has blossomed into a wonderful, long-term team member."

Eklund Rowley says it's gratifying to see the youth grow over the summer.

"They learn so much about themselves. They really learn about what brings them satisfaction in a work

setting. They learn to manage time, problem solve, talk with employers and coworkers, and build skills that will transfer across their careers," she said.




Kendra Redd finished 20th in the shot put with a distance of 27'6" and Cali Pesanti landed in ninth place in the pole vault with her height of 9'0".


And the Copperheads weren't done with medaling just yet, as on the boys' side of the competition, Gabe



He would back up his performance by finishing in fifth in the 200m race where he posted a time of 22.93 seconds. Galle also participated in the long jump, in which he finished 18th with a distance 17'10.5".

Tytan Cook competed in both 110m and 300m hurdles events. He finished the 110m in seventh place with a 16.64-second time and 10th in the 300m with a time of 43.07 seconds.

Overall, the girls posted 10 team points and finished in a tie for 16th place with Forsyth, while the boys finished in 20th with 3 points.









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
